
Opened in 2017, the **Interdisciplinary Science and Engineering Complex (ISEC)** is Northeastern's crowning achievement in research.








"The mix of technical learning and artistic expression is important to me. But I probably wouldn't say that the two are **equally funded** here."




Ryder has seen many renovations in its years, but these costs amount to less than **\$100 million.**
